


### PART 1

### **Student Directions:**



Your friend from Arizona will be visiting you for a week this summer and you plan to visit an estuary near your home. Your friend has never seen an estuary. During a phone call, your friend asked, "What is an estuary and what makes them so special?" Write an informational letter to your friend answering the question. Use information from the reading/book, video, and your experience.



#### Steps you will follow:

To write your informational letter, you will need to do the following:

- 1. Read the book *Let's Visit an Estuary!* and take notes.
- 2. Watch the video *What is an Estuary?* and take notes.
- 3. Answer three questions about the sources.
- 4. Plan, write, and revise your informational letter.

#### **Directions for beginning:**

You will now watch the video *What is an Estuary?* and read the book *Let's Visit an Estuary!* You will take notes on both sources using the note taking tool provided. You may refer to your notes when you answer the research questions and write your letter.

Now discuss with your classmates what you learned from the video and text about estuaries. You may also discuss experiences you or your friends have had with visiting an estuary.

**Teacher Note:** Multiple children's books discuss the topic of estuaries, marshes, and wetlands. You may want to do another read aloud and/or have a tub of books for students to read during silent reading time. Some titles include:


- Squish! A Wetland Walk by Nancy Luenn




### **Estuaries Performance Task: Part 2**


